

## Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults RCIA

Welcome! Thank you for taking the first step in inquiring about membership of the Roman Catholic Church. We are

delighted to accompany you as you know more intimately the living person of Jesus Christ who continues his presence among us in the Church.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is the process by which adults come to learn about and experience the Christian life, specifically our Roman Catholic tradition, and in the fullness of time become initiated into the life of our Church through the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.

RCIA is a spiritual process for anyone who is inquiring about the Catholic Faith, and also for Catholics who are already baptised, but who, for some reason, were never instructed in the faith or celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and/or Holy Eucharist.

## The three goals of RCIA are:

- To instruct participants about the Catholic Church
- To bring about a full conversion as a follower of Jesus Christ
- To become an active member of the faith community

The RCIA begins with a period of inquiry and maturing. This is a time for hearing the first preaching of the Gospel and of prayer. The end of this period is marked by the first stage or step: The Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens.

The second period is called the Catechumenate. This is a time of more intense preaching and teaching of the Gospel, prayer, instruction, handing on the sacred traditions of the Catholic faith, and personal contact with members of the larger Christian community. This period ends with "The Rite of Election" when the catechumens are ready to respond totally to God's call to faith through the sacraments of initiation.

The third period takes place during Lent. It is a time of purification and enlightenment for a more profound spiritual preparation. Its focus and conclusion is the Easter Vigil and the sacraments of initiation.

The final period takes place during the Easter Season. The newly baptized can deepen their experience of the sacraments and of being new members of the Christian community.

If you are interested in being initiated into the Roman Catholic Church, please consider attending Mass at a nearby parish and contact the Parish Priest to enquire if they have an RCIA programme.
